COURSE DESCRIPTION

Course Title: AP European History

Course Number: 00152

Course Prerequisites: Completion of AP US History with a final grade of 80% or above or completion of World History 1600-Present with a final grade of 85% or above

Course Description:

AP European History covers the period of the late Middle Ages to the Present Day. This course will include an overview of the social, political, religious, intellectual, technological, and economic developments of Europe. Students will study the major events, key concepts, and important people in European History. Students will demonstrate an understanding of cause and effect, make historical generalizations, use maps, charts, and other data, develop hypotheses and evaluate primary historical documents. This course is writing intensive. AP European History may be taken in place of the required 12th grade social studies courses.

A final exam is required.

This course may be taken in place of the required 12th grade social studies course.

Suggested Grade Level: 12

Length of Course: One Semester X Two Semesters Other

The class will meet 5 days a week for 42 minutes each day.
